#### Category 1 - Adult

#### **Category 2 - Young Gardeners**

Age Group 1 (Ages 6 to 11 years) - Best display of growing flowers in containers or garden.

1st prize £20 voucher, 2nd prize £15 voucher and 3rd prize £10 voucher.

**Age Group 2 (Ages 12 to 16 years)** - Best display of growing flowers in containers or garden. **1st prize** £20 voucher, **2nd prize** £15 voucher and **3rd prize** £10 voucher.

The vouchers would be redeemable at the local garden centre at Trevenson Moor.

**Category 3 - Businesses and Organisations –** Best display of growing flowers in containers or a window display **1st Prize** a trophy and a certificate. Plus, Highly Commended Certificates for the two runners up.

# **Parish Council Chairman David Ekinsmyth**

I would like to wish everyone all best wishes for 2012. I am afraid this is a little late, but I hope all has gone well so far. Since the last edition the Council has been very active on both financial and organisational fronts.



This is the time of year that budgets and precepts must be set to enable us to function in the next financial year.

Those of you that came along to our meetings will have heard the debates about these matters and the very serious consideration given to all the decisions. Whilst it is a time of financial difficulty nationally, it is also a time when the Parish Council is likely to have to perform extra duties and functions and must therefore keep reserves available for these contingencies.

We also have to fund the projects we have agreed to carry out, like the development of the 'Hub' at the Village Hall, and the enhancement of its facilities. I have described this before and expect the project to provide new facilities for all members of the parish as well as an office facility for the council. There are still some matters to clear up before this can go ahead, but hopefully it will be in place before the end of this year.

If you are interested in how the council's finances are managed do come along to a council meeting, they are all advertised on our notice boards (on the Platt, the shop at Park Bottom and Tolvaddon). Full information on meetings is also available on the web site.

Elsewhere in the Review you will read of all the activities the council has organised or is proposing or supporting for the future. This is an exciting year nationally with the Queen's Jubilee and the Olympics in the summer. The Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall would like there to be street parties and other celebrations the area, so how about organising one. Your councillors are always willing to support local groups in these activities. I would like to thank all of you that give time and expertise to our activities.

Most of these activities were first suggested in the Parish Plan, yes it is not forgotten, and the Council will be reviewing progress on this and I will report back. The work we did on parish development in the Plan will inform our responses to the Cornwall Core Strategy consultation as it will the Neighbourhood Plan that we now have to develop. These consultations and plans are very important for the future of the parish, and the wider Camborne, Pool, Illogan Redruth Community Area and I would welcome the input of anyone who wishes to do so.

I am afraid I have to report that our Clerk is still unable to return to her duties which are now fully covered by our Locum Clerk, Sarah Willsher. The office is open on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. I know I say this in every report but if you want to find out more about what the council is doing try to get along to a meeting. You will be made most welcome and have the opportunity to speak.

#### **KILIMANJARO**

Congratulations to James Gay of Illogan Downs who late last year raised the grand sum of £5,064 for the charity ATAXIA UK by making it to the top of Uhuru Peak, Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest mountain peak on the mainland African continent.



James set himself a target of £4,000 for the charity which supports people who have problems affecting speech, balance and movement. As well as

scaling the 5,895mt (9,341ft) dormant volcano in Tanzania James exceeded his fundraising target by more than £1,000

James said "I really didn't expect to raise that much money and I really want to thank everyone who helped me make it to the top of Kilimanjaro. 

#### **ILLOGAN ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION**

.The next meeting of the Association is the AGM planned for Monday April 16th 2012. This will be in the Parish Rooms at St. Illogan Church at 7:00 pm.

**PLEASE** would all those people who still want an allotment attend this meeting or at least send their apologies if they

cannot make it.

After 4½ years of waiting for an allotment site then people's needs may have



changed. I now need to have an up to date list of numbers in order to update the Parish Council on the amount of land that is required to accommodate us.

If there is time after the AGM we will have the annual seed and plant swap.

At this meeting we need to elect a new Treasurer to the committee, so please if you are willing to stand for election or would like to nominate someone else (with their permission) then please let me have names before this meeting. I can be contacted by any of the means at the end. Here is the recipe for using excess courgettes as promised in the last edition.

#### **PASTA SAUCE**

Onions – sliced 500g (1lb), Courgettes – sliced 500g(1lb), Tomatoes –whole 500g(1lb), Olive Oil - Larger amounts can be used but keep roughly the same proportions.

Soften the onions in a saucepan with approx 1 tablespoon of the oil until translucent, *put to one side*.

Roast the tomatoes with approx 1 tablespoon of the oil until the skins are coloured and then simmer until well reduced. *Again put to one side.* 

Sear the courgettes on both sides with approx 1 tablespoon of the oil and then cover the pan and simmer until soft. (The final sauce has a slightly different taste if all the ingredients are cooked separately and then mixed, but they can be done in one pan if you prefer).

Mix all the cooked vegetables together and if a smooth sauce is preferred, then liquidise them.

The resulting sauce can be put into containers and frozen, or heated until boiling and then poured into sterilised jars.

When reheating, season to taste and if a redder coloured sauce is preferred then stir in some tomato puree.

#### **CORNWALL CORE STRATEGY**

Recently there has been a series of public consultations held by Cornwall Council regarding the proposed Cornwall Core Strategy.

With the demise of the previous plan (The RSS) some 18 months ago, Cornwall Council was tasked with the production of a new plan and the Public are being invited to view and comment accordingly on the proposal.

The plan defines, along with many other proposals that, in total, Cornwall can expect some 48,000 new homes with supporting infrastructure over a 20 year period, 7,000 of these being built in the Camborne, Pool, Reduth & Illogan Parish areas. Of this 7,000 some 138 have been completed, 477 are being built and an additional 2,231 have planning permission granted. The balance of 4,154 has until 2030 to have planning permission completed.

#### **ILLOGAN PARISH**

There are two Urban Extension areas planned within the Parish. The area defined as UE4 will run from Illogan Downs past the shop and New Inn at Park Bottom to near the top of Trevellyan Terrace and will spread back through the fields, half way to Trevenson Moor. There is the potential in this area for 300 new homes and some multifunctional public open space.

The other area defined as UE3 is at Tolvaddon and will run from the Industrial Site along to Halgoss, spreading part way down into the valley towards Illogan Downs. There is the potential in this area for 375 new homes and some community facilities. The Core Strategy proposal detail can be viewed at www.cornwall.gov.uk/ldf follow the core strategy and online consultation links.

Latest Phone scam: Initial contact is to your phone, usually from the Indian sub - continent.

The caller will direct you to areas of your pc where you would never normally visit and you will be shown a listing of 'corrupted files' These files will not normally cause any problem to you at all, however, the caller will tell that they will multiply and cause damage and they need to be removed and programmes installed which will prevent further corruption occurring.

#### If you haven't already done so, hang up at this point

The next stage is considerably more dangerous - you will be asked for the control of your PC to be passed to the caller who will carry out the necessary cleaning actions and install the software for your future use. If you do this the caller will have access to virtually all areas of your PC and who knows what else could, or will be done. You will be asked for your credit card details and charged up to £90 for this activity. You are actually only paying for

the so called clean up because the downloaded programmes are actually genuine freeware and can be found on the internet and downloaded free of charge if you so require them.

#### Scouts come to the rescue of woodland birds.

Scouts from the 5th Redruth troop wanted to work towards community and woodworking badges, so contacted the Friends of Maningham Wood to see if they could be of any help in the woodland.

At the end of last year they helped clear the overgrown willow sculpture to create a woodland glade, on the right hand side of the path as you enter from the main gate, in this now sun drenched space wild flowers will grow to feed insects such as bees and butterflies.



This year they have made a number of nest boxes to replace those that were vandalised in 2010. We will be putting these (higher) up in the trees sometime in February.

so that are ready for the birds to use during nesting season; so keep watching to see whether they get used this year.



The long-awaited Nature Trail has finally arrived and will be installed throughout the woodland and the churchyard during February. There will eventually be quiz leaflets available from local shops and meeting places, and we hope to launch it later in the spring, so watch out for posters on the Platt.

# **Tehidy Country Park and Illogan woods**



As we start to move into Spring and away from those Winter months we maybe all need reminding that on our doorstep we have some great assets well worth a visit. Tehidy Woods, with its myriad of footpaths and acres of woodland trees, offers an opportunity for a peaceful walk of exploration, and with the coming Spring the eye-catching displays of Bluebells and Rhododendrons.

Illogan Woods provides us with a meandering footpath leading from Parsonage Well down through the trees to emerge at Portreath. Small birds, the occasional Buzzard and Squirrels can often be seen, and a small culvert half way down provides the opportunity for the youngsters to have fun with 'Pooh sticks'

Entry to Illogan Woods is at Parsonage Well. There is a rough stone track which leads from Illogan through the woods to Portreath in a steady decent. This path can get muddy after rainfall and a small stream follows the meandering path down.

Bluebells and wild garlic are the predominant plants here with plenty of bird life.

#### WHO WAS ST PIRAN?

No one can state for sure who St Piran was

One can only sift for clues in documents written many years after his time. In the past many writers have stated with confidence the facts of his ancestry. It is believed that St Piran was born in Ireland. This decision is based on the ties with St Kieran of Saighir. This saint was born and raised on the island of Cape Clear, off County Cork, by his father Lughaidh and his mother Liedania. After studying scriptures in Rome he returned to Ireland and was made a bishop at his monastic settlement Saighir Kieran in County Ossary. There is no reference to his death and there is no shrine to his honour yet he is one of the twelve most revered saints in the Irish calendar.

At this time St Piran lands on Perran beach and builds the tiny oratory. There is no written word attributing his pedigree. He and his followers build the oratory in the Irish style with the heads of a man, a woman and a beast around the arched doorway The priest's house is built inside the graveyard as in the Irish style. It is interesting that the three communities mentioned celebrate March 5th as their Saints day thus making a strong Kieran-Piran connection.

The trail continues with the clues from the old church of St Piran. An inventory taken in 1281 by the canons of Exeter, record a bone of St Brendon and a bone of St Martin both associates of St Kieran. The churches of Exeter and Kilkenny Ireland, who held the monasteries of St Piran and St Kieran respectively, regularly exchanged Deans and Bishops.

One thing is certain, the suggestion that St Piran is St Kieran of Clonmacnoise does not stand as this saint is recorded to have died at the age of 32 and is buried at his monastery.

Many people have claimed many things but nothing is sure, It can only be surmised who St Piran was, where he came from, how he arrived on our shores. One thing is sure. St Piran lives on in the hearts and minds of the Cornish people here in Cornwall and around the world.

**WASSAILING** for a happy, healthy and fruitful New Year

Wassailing, the ancient traditional custom was re-enacted again recently when friends and Park Rangers gathered in Tehidy Wood to bless the apple trees and toast the beginning of another year.

In the gathering darkness, each first satisfied their thirst with cider, and ate apple cake, pies and buns before chanting the age-old songs, accompanied by violin and antique pipe.

Here's to thee old apple tree
Whence thou mayst bud
And whence thou mayst blow
And whence thou mayst bear apples enow
Hats full! Caps full!
Bushel-bushel-sacks full
And our pockets full too! Huzza!

Next comes the sprinkling of cider on the tree trunks and toast placed in the forked branches to appease the birds who are requested to keep the trees free from harmful insects.

Finally, a noisy procession takes place to rouse the trees and banish all harmful influences.

And so, with our chants becoming increasingly incoherent we offered sincere thanks to the Park Rangers and good wishes all round.

Next year's apple pies and cider should now be assured-- don't you think you ought to give it a try yourselves?

The fuel used for the Olympic torch has varied. Early torches used solid or liquid fuels, including olive oil. Since the Munich Games of 1972, most torches have instead used liquefied gas such as propylene or a propane/butane mixture in canisters.

These are easily stored, easily controlled and give a bright luminous flame

Wassail bowls, generally in the shape of goblets, have been preserved. The Worshipful Company of Grocers made a very elaborate one in the seventeenth century, decorated with silver. It is so large that it must have passed around as a "loving cup" so that many members of the guild could drink from it
