This time of year is something of a paradox in Parish Council life. The calendar year is nearing its end; yet there is still a good half of the municipal year still to go. Already, probable and possible services and activities have to be identified and agreed so that budgets can be set for the Council's "new year" starting in April and the funding identified. The totals have to be passed to Cornwall Council by the end of December as the overall Council Tax calculations are prepared there.

It is very likely that from next year Illogan Parish Council will become the facilitator - even the deliverer - of a number of services and facilities currently supplied from or through Cornwall Council.

For instance, following the questionnaire circulated in late summer, there is strong support for the transfer of Illogan Park. To do that, all the service and staff details regarding maintenance and inspection will have to have been sorted, not to mention new or replacement facilities and equipment. Busy times beckon to meet the deadlines.

This year therefore, some of us, in even more than usual, will be looking forward to the switching on of the Lights at Paynters Lane End and then Park Bottom on Friday 13th and Saturday 14th December. It will be an achievement of sorts to have got to that point stilling standing up! I very much look forward to meeting many of you at those events. These evenings have become a happy and enjoyable community celebration and I hope that this time, particularly, they will herald a shift to a new style of council services to and for all of us in Illogan.



Exciting News!!

ILLOGAN PARK

Thank you to everyone who completed the questionnaire enclosed in the autumn edition of the Illogan Review. We received a healthy number of completed questionnaires. The responses were collated and discussed by members of Illogan Parish Council's Devolution Committee at the end of September.

Questionnaire Responses Summary

89% of respondents felt that Illogan Parish Council should take over the ownership and maintenance of Illogan Park.

The park is regularly used by all age groups of the community; mostly for general leisure and play.

The most popular encouragements to use the Park more (in the order listed) were seating, new/improved play equipment, public conveniences, picnic areas, more bins; café/snack bar and plants.

Other improvements highlighted were litter and waste management, control of dogs, separate areas for dogs, improved access and parking including disabled access and all-weather paths to children's play area, links to other amenity areas, improved sports pitches and changing facilities, improved general upkeep of the area, introducing community areas, holding events in the park, adding lighting around the park, picnic tables, improved safety and security including wardens and locking the park at night, use of part of the park for allotments, and improved signage to the park.

As a result of the questionnaire responses, Illogan Parish Council resolved at the Extra Ordinary Full Council meeting held on the 9 October 2013 that:

Illogan Parish Council is minded to seek the freehold of Illogan Park subject to an affordable outcome following:

 The authorisation of a face-to-face meeting as soon as possible between appropriate portfolio holders at Cornwall Council, the Illogan Council Chairman and the Illogan Devolution Committee Chairman, with the attendance of appropriate officers of both councils, to address the many issues already identified with the park still outstanding and determine contingent liabilities;



- The drafting and costing of a delivery plan identifying, amongst other factors, the revenue and capital costs to meet all statutory requirements governing the various facilities currently enjoyed by users of the park;
- The prompt recruitment of a suitably experienced and qualified project manager on a contract term basis to prepare such a delivery plan.

The Council will put regular updates on the website and in the Illogan Review. If you would like regular updates on the Park either via email, letter or telephone please contact the Clerk who will be more than happy to record your details and forward the information to you in your chosen format.

Community Safety



"Silent night, Holy night. All is calm, all is bright."

As we've come to expect, Christmas carols and songs are already playing in the shops. Much of the charm about them is that they present us with a feeling of security and peace.

One of the most famous Christmas songs ever written, 'White Christmas' by Irving Berlin paints a beautifully nostalgic picture — of Christmas, "just like the ones I used to know, where the tree tops glisten and children listen to hear sleigh bells in the snow." But the reality is often very different isn't it?

Last time, I wrote about Illogan Parish Plan and the aim of fostering "a sense of belonging, and pride in the place we live." The second aim in the plan is this: "To support further initiatives that will improve community safety." The associated objectives are to reduce litter and dog muck, and vandalism and anti-social behaviour, and to provide safe passage for transport and pedestrians, and particularly for school children. Our world isn't always as beautiful as we'd like it to be and we have to take steps to make it beautiful.

This is the kind of community we want to live in isn't it? A place that is beautiful, cared for and safe. More than that, this is the kind of *world* we want to live in! Our Christmas carols and songs express that desire, and paint romantic (and slightly unrealistic!) pictures:

"Chestnuts roasting on an open fire, Jack Frost nipping at your nose. Yuletide carols being sung by a choir and all dressed up like eskimos."

"Make safe the way that leads on high, and close the paths to misery"

These words (above) are part of the advent carol, 'O Come , O Come Immanuel'. Immanuel is a Hebrew word: עָמָנוּאֵל It's a word that means 'God is with us'.

The hymn expresses sadness at the state of things; the community found themselves, in a place of captivity, despondency, and spiritual oppression. The hymn is a cry for something more beautiful, something safer.

Its strikes me that this is not so far away from the desire expressed in the parish plan! The desire is for something more beautiful (less litter, dog muck, vandalism and graffiti) and far safer (for traffic, pedestrians and children.) It's right that we work towards a safer community, and a safer world. It's right that we desire a community which is free from ugliness and danger. So what answer do we find in the songs of Christmas?

The hymn recognises that the answer to ugliness and danger is found ultimately in the presence and work of God in a community, and so the words express a longing for the one who is called 'God with Us' (Immanuel) to come. "Come, O come Immanuel".

"No ear may hear his coming, but in this world of sin, Where the meek souls receive him, still the dear Christ enters in."

My favourite Christmas carol of all, O Little Town of Bethlehem, contains the words above. It reminds us of the Christian view that God himself entered our world, with all its danger and ugly bits; a world affected by selfishness. He entered in as a vulnerable baby, not as an armed warrior, and gave himself to rescue and transform God's creation.

So, of course we can impose rules and regulations, we can build safer and more beautiful communities, but ultimately it is as we turn from selfishness to love, and from rules to a desire to see heaven on earth, that true and lasting transformation happens.

And so Christmas time presents us with an opportunity to turn back to God and to live life His way.

O Come all ye Faithful, Joyful and triumphant,
O come ye, O come ye to Bethlehem.
Come and behold him, Born the King of angels.
O come let us adore him, O come let us adore him,
O come let us adore him, Christ the Lord.

Wishing you a very beautiful and safe Christmas, and a happy new year.

GRANT FUNDING AVAILABLE FROM ILLOGAN PARISH COUNCIL

A grant is any payment made by the Council, to be used by a local organisation for a specific purpose to improve the wellbeing of the local community, either generally or for a specific purpose, and which is not directly controlled or administered by the Council. Illogan Parish Council awards grants at its discretion to community organisations which can demonstrate a clear need for financial support.

The organisation must be non-profit making or charitable. Grants cannot be made to individuals. Grants will not be made retrospectively. The Council will only consider one application from each organisation in any one financial year. The budget for grants is set annually as part of the general budget setting procedure.

POLITE NOTICES

As a courtesy to those members of the public who have asked us, may we draw to your attention the following:

Barking Dogs. We have had a few complaints concerning dogs who bark constantly when left in gardens. It may be that you are unaware that your dog is doing this as no-one has mentioned it to you. Perhaps you are working or away for the day, or the radio or TV covers the sound. Neighbours do have the right to complain under Part III of the Environmental Protection Act 1990—Noise Nuisance. This law empowers local authorities (in this case, Cornwall Council) to deal with noise from fixed premises where it can be proved that the noise is prejudicial to health and/or is causing an unreasonable and persistent disturbance to one's lifestyle. In other words, if you dog is causing a continuous disturbance, you could be fined.

Car Horns. We have also had a couple of complaints concerning car horns. The sounding of horns is illegal, day or night, unless the vehicle is in danger of an accident. Police can impose a fixed penalty notice fine of £30 and issue penalty points.

Bus Timetables. Timetables are generally available in shops and the One Stop Shop at Dolcoath Avenue have a supply. New timetables will be issued in 2014. Please be aware that some information in this year's edition may be out of date. Illogan School Extension Works

The Midas Construction team have now been on site at Illogan School since early August, constructing a large extension to the existing school including a multi-use main hall, kitchen, teaching facilities and reception. We were lucky enough to have a nice dry start on site which allowed us to complete all bulk excavation and foundations works without causing too much mess and disruption. All foundations and foul drainage are now complete and concrete slabs cast, so we are now moving onto the main building structure.



We had several days where the weather was against us, which meant we couldn't use the cranes to erect the frame as the wind speed was over 15 knots. Since the weather has improved we are starting to see some real progress with the timber and steel frames. Weather permitting, we hope to have the main structural frames completed within the next two weeks and commence cladding the buildings.

THE SWINGS ARE BACK!





I am delighted to be able to report that on Monday 23 September the planning applications for our Camborne, Pool, Redruth and Hayle Emergency Cover programme were considered and approved by the Sub-Area West Planning Committee. This marks the achievement of a critical milestone in the programme and moves us one step closer to delivering our new facilities, and to improving the fire, rescue and community safety service that we deliver 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to the people of Cornwall.

Our focus has now moved to appointing a contractor for the programme and commencing building works. It is hoped that construction will start late this year or early 2014 with completion in the autumn of 2014. This is subject to any sustained periods of inclement weather which may cause delays with the construction process.

The new stations will be staffed by on-call and whole-time firefighters and we will be looking to recruit on-call firefighters in the near future. Our on-call firefighters play a key role in keeping communities safe, responding to a variety of emergency situations (fire, road traffic collisions, flooding, etc).

To become an on-call firefighter, it doesn't matter whether or not you have a 'main job', or even what it is (you could be a florist, builder, dentist, housewife, student or travel agent!) just as long as you can commit to, and balance a career with Cornwall Fire and Rescue Service. However, you must be at least 17 years and 6 months old to begin training (you need to be at least 18 years old before starting employment as a firefighter), be physically fit and live or work very close to your Community Fire Station.



GARDENERS' CORNER

(Courtesy of Trevenson Moor Garden Centre)

As we move into Winter there are still jobs that will need doing in the garden and keep you warm:

- harvest winter crops such as leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage etc.
- prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- deciduous trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted
- clear soil of weeds and old crops and dig over before it becomes too wet or frozen
- move tender plants to a greenhouse or sheltered spot – if not then protect 'in situ'
- clear fallen leaves why not make a leaf compost bin to make 'leaf mould' for use next year?
- raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
- empty and clean plant pots and trays ready for next year, and clean tools
- insulate outdoor containers with bubblewrap/fleece to prevent cracking from frost

In Cornwall we usually escape severe bad weather at this time of year BUT BE PREPARED! Check:

- protection is firmly in place over Autumn-sown crops
- winter protection structures are firm and safe
- · greenhouse heaters are working and set correctly
- action is taken to stop ponds freezing over and exposed water pipes cracking

Finally, don't forget the wildlife. We all know about the birds and the bees so let's put our knowledge to good use and make sure we leave access to food and water, especially if there is a cold snap. Even if you are trying to be tidy, leaving seed heads or branches with berries acts as a good food supply to wildlife during winter.

If you need any further information or advice feel free to pop in to the Garden Centre anytime where we would be pleased to help you.

Have a great Christmas and New Year but if you get stuck for things to do then you and the family can always sit around the fire, browse over next year's seed catalogues and start planning what to sow in Spring!

Clare and Toni, youth workers for Illogan, work in and around the village and run sessions on Tuesday evenings at the Village Hall from 6.00pm to 9.00pm. This youth provision started in April 2013 and is proving successful.

They started by getting to know the area, focusing on parks and estates and promoting the new "Youth" group. They handed out flyers and built a rapport with the young people, made connections with parents, residents, the local PCSO and local shops. By providing activities, games and a barbecue within the estates they gained the confidence of the young people and parents, which then enabled them to invite young people to the Village Hall.

Activities have included parachute games, team games, tennis, rounders, litter-picking (the Clean Cornwall campaign), barbecues, cooking and healthy eating workshops, arts and crafts, entering local competitions, jewellery-making, anti-bullying workshops, internet and computer safety workshops.

Future plans include providing advice and guidance regarding education, relationships, careers, family issues, challenging behaviour in a positive way and linking groups with new groups to combat bullying. They hope to engage young people in more positive projects and to broaden participation as well as provide a safe space for youth-led activities.

Their highest priority is safeguarding — for the youths and themselves — and they are linked in with local authority provision, including law enforcement, to ensure everyone's safety.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Doorstep Sales



Beware of doorstep salespeople. Firstly, you're made to feel grateful, as the friendly salesperson turns up on your doorstep with a gift (perhaps a plant or some chocolates) and it seems rude not to invite him/her in. Secondly, they pick up on things you have in your home, such as photos of your family, or hobbies, and pretend they are keen on the same things — a ploy to gain your trust! Thirdly, they say they have a special discount for you, and may even pretend to check with their boss, then it's the old tale of "if you don't order today, you'll miss out on a bargain"; almost pushing you to sign on the spot.

The fourth ploy is to make you feel committed to the service - that you'll lose out if you don't buy. They get you to agree to harmless statements about how your life would be made easier. By answering 'Yes' you are starting to say 'Yes' to the sale without realising it, and then feel embarrassed by not buying. The fifth tactic is to make you feel you will be just as happy as all of the other contented customers. The sixth tactic is to make you feel as if the service is endorsed by an expert, such as having been tested thoroughly by an approved professional association, charity, celebrity or council. By now, you are glowing with pride in what you've done by signing up for something you may never use. As for the salesperson – "Bingo."

To sum it up, I suggest you buy wisely. There are some key dos and don'ts to bear in mind:

Don't sign on-the-spot. Consider whether you want the goods or service.

Always shop around for the best price.

Be wary of special offers, or warnings about your home.

Don't hand over a cash deposit.

Don't agree to a trader starting work right away.

Talk to someone you know and trust for a second opinion.

Just be aware, as sadly it is all too easy to get ripped off.

TEHIDY COUNTRY PARK



Events

Woodland Management

We are part way through a five year programme of creating 'rides' in the woodland and this will be continuing over the coming winter. The aim of forming these long, narrow clearings in the Oak Wood and North Cliffs Plantation areas of the park is to increase the age structure and diversity of habitats in the woodland for a larger range of wildlife. Many of the trees will re-grow, forming a dense shrub layer which is already benefiting insects, small mammals, birds and bats in the areas where felling has been carried out in previous years.

The work is carried out in the winter months to minimise disturbance to nesting birds and other wildlife, and has already been started this year with the assistance of students from Duchy College at Rosewarne and University of Exeter at Penryn. The remainder of this work will be completed by the end of February by Cormac Solutions tree works specialists. Some paths may have to be closed for short periods for tree felling so please take notice of any warning signs you come across.

Footpaths

Some of the footpaths around the lake and stream area of the park have recently been improved to make them smoother to use; particularly for those with pushchairs and wheelchairs. The boardwalk on the south side of the lake had reached the end of its useful life and so has been replaced by a short section of hard path along the side of the small pond.

Volunteers

Over the last 18 months or so a small group of volunteers have been working to restore the 'Rose Garden' area. This was once part of the more formal grounds of the Basset estate and is now hidden away in the middle of the woods. If you haven't already found this peaceful glade with its planted beds and benches to relax on it's well worth a visit.

Volunteer work sessions are organised on the first Friday of each month (second Friday in January) from 10.00am to 1.00pm, led by the countryside rangers from Cormac Solutions. The work undertaken varies from bramble clearance to stream bank maintenance but there's always plenty to do. At the last session two sculptures, created by local artist Kerry Davis, were installed in the centre of the Rose Garden. Two more will follow shortly to complete the set.

MANINGHAM WOOD NATURE NOTE

Walkers in Maningham Wood will have noticed the nature signs along the way and now that the leaves are falling, signs of some animals and birds will be more easily seen.

The ROOKERY is the first sign but all is quiet up above until February when nest building will begin again. There are usually about 50 nests.

Next comes the WOODPECKER. Notice that the old hollow tree, which is full of juicy grubs, has been pecked away. Soon it will be gone.

A right hand turn takes us to a THRUSH sign. Thrushes are quiet at this time but in spring their song fills the wood. More likely to be seen now is the REDWING, a member of the thrush family, which is only here in winter.

Near the large acorn is the NUTHATCH sign. This bird is usually high in the trees where it nests in holes, and wedges nuts into the bark to peck them.

As you leave the wood at the edge of Glebe Field the PIPISTRELLE BAT sign shows where bats are active on summer evenings. At this time of year they are hibernating in cold caves and mine shafts.

Along the path is a hollow oak tree where several JACKDAWS nest. Other nesting places include the church roof and tower and mine engine houses.

BLUE TITS usually occupy a nest box near the corner of the churchyard. They have large families and have to work hard catching caterpillars to raise them.

Towards the end of the trail, near Thomas Merritt's grave, is a sign showing that SLOW WORMS live here. We have put down iron sheets beneath which they hide.

We hope you enjoyed your walk and found at least some of the signs. The Maningham Wood nature trail was set up by the Friends of Maningham Wood.



In the last edition of the Review we included an article about how Illogan Schoolchildren got involved in knitting squares for blankets for Fish and Chip babies in Uganda. Since then, and after researching this poignant story, it turns out that these Fish and Chip babies (so-called because they are sent home from hospital wrapped in newspaper) are not limited to Uganda. New-born babies across Africa are in need of warm clothing and blankets.

There are a number of websites that highlight the problems and many include knitting patterns for jumpers, hats, blankets and even teddies. Approximately three times a year knitted articles are gathered up from collection points all over England and sent to Africa. Our nearest collection points are the Wesleyan Chapel, Camborne, or the Knitcraft wool shop, Pool.


