Many of us are very disappointed by the decision to over-rule the reasoned rejection by Illogan and Cornwall Councils of the proposal to develop this site with housing.

At its meeting on 18th January when many residents attended, Illogan Parish Council agreed to move forward in these three ways to make the best of this unwelcome outcome.

INVOLVE US ALL

The meeting offered by the Diocese's agents must be open to everyone here and not just limited to a cosy chat with only a few favoured people chosen by them.

FINAL LAYOUT

Illogan Council must be involved with every aspect of design, layout, open spaces and finishes through the formal planning consultation process.

ROAD SAFETY

The junction at Bridge Road is already overloaded and it is not unreasonable to expect the developers to fund the design of a new arrangement here.

Although I feel that there is some genuine misunderstanding of exactly what powers a Parish Council does have, it is a fact of life that the more any organisation, or person, does the more they are open to questions and disagreement from some quarters.

You will soon have the chance to show how you feel in the forthcoming local elections. You have every right to question decisions taken at any level, but I urge you please to reinforce that by turning out to vote in these elections in order to get the council that you feel you deserve. I would even urge you to take a step further and, if you are feeling really dissatisfied, stand in these elections yourself.

If you are thinking of standing please talk to any of us, or the Clerk, as to what this involves and what it means to be a local councillor. I will end by telling you that it is unpaid, and can be pretty thankless, but can also be extremely interesting and very rewarding when we "get it right".

Welcome to 2017 which has already provided plenty of major issues at international, national and local levels to think about!



The outcome of the Glebe Field Appeal has been a great disappointment to us all. It seems that local opinion and environmental issues counts for little, having been trumped by the need to build houses and particularly 'affordable' ones. Very few would question the desirability of providing homes for all who need them but they must be in the right place and on the right terms. In my view this new development meets neither requirement but we must now make the best of the situation and ensure the harm is mitigated as much as possible. Watch out for a public meeting on this in the near future.

Road Safety matters have also occupied a lot of my time, they are of considerable concern to our community. The 'Speed Watch' team has been operating in Alexandra Road, Bassett Road and Paynters Lane, and we will become more active as we complete our training. Anybody who would like to get involved please do get in touch as the larger the team the more we can cover. Other matters involve dangerous junctions such as Bridge Road and Church Road and parking issues such as the verges in Coronation Road.

The development of the Glebe Field will serve to add additional traffic hazards to the centre of the village and I believe a safer road system must be one outcome of consultation with the developers. We are fortunate to live in a community that has demonstrated its ability to come together when required to achieve the maintenance of the environment and community services. This requirement will only increase so do consider getting involved more formally with the Neighbourhood Plan or Speed watch groups or standing as a candidate for Parish Councillor in May.

WHAT DOES IT INVOLVE?

This May (4th) sees the 'all-out' elections not only to Cornwall Council but also Illogan Parish Council. In each case, all seats are open for contest.

Illogan Parish Council – as well as being a "Statutory Consultee" on Planning matters (mainly applications for development) – provides a wide range of services and looks after/owns a variety of 'open spaces' including Illogan Park, Manningham Woods; the Wells by Illogan Wood entrance and Rosemullion Gardens at Tolvaddon. Such areas also include various facilities and a substantial project is in preparation for Illogan Park.

The list of areas and services is expanding rapidly and, with changes in the overall Local Government world, will increase to other roles and functions.

In general terms, candidature is open to those living or working in/near the administrative area and/or on the list of electors.

Demands of Membership include the monthly meeting of Full Council and active involvement in the Committees that manage and direct the Council's work and internal functions (such as Staffing and Financial matters). Training will be given.

Membership of a Local Council is a responsible, demanding and often an enjoyable and fulfilling voluntary service in and for the community where we live. In summary, it is the "sharp end".

POLICE LIAISON

This committee is one of the most interesting as it provides a link into the work of the local police. It was set up to replace the attendance of a police officer at our Full Council meeting. We meet bi-monthly and all Local Parish Councils are represented as well as both Camborne and Redruth Town Councils. It is chaired by a senior police officer and is usually attended by a representative of the local MP.

We are kept up to date with the local crime figures which I am pleased to say have gone down during the past year. We get to know about local initiatives such as evening checks at local supermarket car parks. Cars are checked to see if such things as child seats and seat belts are fitted correctly. It came as a surprise to me that parents would not put their children in safe seats.

The CCTV in local towns is now being monitored at the Fire Station at Tolvaddon.

Illogan Park is being visited on a regular basis following reports of anti-social behaviour. Manningham Woods too is checked for drug use and fires being lit.

Speed checks in our area is a new initiative and number plate recognition could result in drivers who exceed the speed limit getting an advisory letter with further action being taken if necessary.

Parking outside schools is an issue that really needs to be addressed and parents should remember to take care and park responsibly.

I would like to continue to represent the Parish of Illogan on this committee so if there are any issues you would like me to raise, please let me know.

DANGEROUS DRIVING

It has been brought to our attention that there are cars, buses and commercial vehicles turning right from Robartes Terrace into Bridge Road on the right hand side of the bollards. Drivers are going onto the wrong side of the road, cutting the corner and are often travelling at high speed.

This has resulted in several near misses including a cyclist nearly being knocked off their bike, an elderly resident nearly being run over and a family with young children nearly getting hit by someone on the wrong side of the road travelling at high speed.

Anyone wishing to cross over Bridge Road is at risk partly due to the lack of pavement on the south side of the road. Pedestrians are forced to walk in the road which puts them in danger. It is common place to see elderly persons and people with prams forced to walk on the painted white line on the road as they are unable to walk on the narrow pavement; this places them in the direct pathway of these drivers who are on the wrong side of the road to enter Bridge Road.

Please could all drivers ensure that they drive with care and remain on the correct side of the road. If anyone witnesses any poor driving please report incidents to the police and if appropriate the bus company with as much information on the date, time and vehicle details as possible.



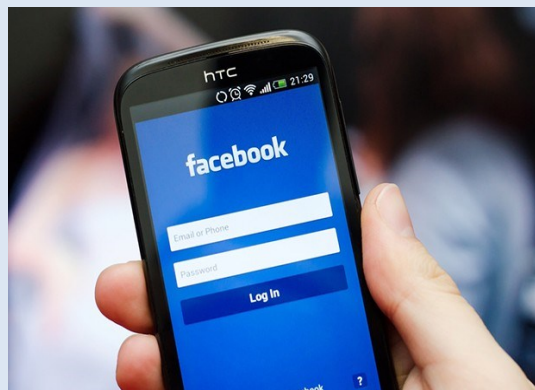
NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

You may be aware that there has been a rise in the reporting of victims being recruited via Facebook to sell items for suspects on eBay – often stating that it is a quick way of making money.

The items are said to be bankrupt stock, purchased via auctions, and need to be sold on quickly. The majority of items reported have been Apple Mac Book Pro/Electrical Items.

The victim places the items on eBay and once the items are sold, the victim will get paid and transfer the funds to the suspect/recruiter.

Once the suspect/recruiter gets the funds, the purchasers are claiming that they have received empty cereal boxes or often no goods at all, leaving the victim being reported as the actual suspect, and leaving them out of pocket as their account will be debited.



PROTECT YOURSELF:

Consider conducting research on other information provided by the seller, for example a mobile phone number or email address could alert you to negative information associated with the number/email address on line.

Be very cautious of unsolicited emails or approaches over social media promising opportunities to make easy money.

When accepting offers, verify the Company entity provided to you and check whether they have been registered in the UK.

If you think the deal or offer is too good to be true then it probably is. If you, or anyone you know, has been affected by this fraud – or any other scam, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

Tackling debt issues in the area - 'Money Skills for Life' project has been launched!



The Community Network is working in partnership with Citizens Advice Cornwall and Coastline Housing on a new project called 'Money Skills for Life', we have Lottery funding to address the issues of personal and household debt, by training life coaches to help people in the local community who need support with changing their relationship with money. We now have the life coaches trained, who are all ready to have one to one sessions with people that need help.

ILLOGAN PARISH FAIR

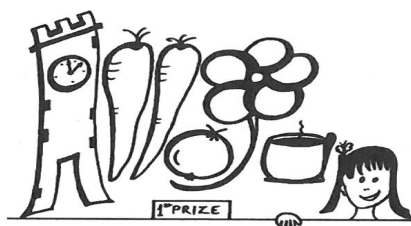

ILLOGAN AND CYCLE TRAILS

Many *Illogan Review* readers will either have heard of or used the Great Flat Load Cycle Trail. It runs south of Carn Brea starting near Tincroft Mine and is a great draw for residents and visitors alike. Another very popular cycle trail in Cornwall is the Camel Trail which uses the dismantled railway line (and bridges) from Wadebridge and beyond.

Off-road cycling in some respects is less stressful, less dangerous and great fun for all ages. It's an activity that can be enjoyed together by all ages and abilities.

Our Parish Council would like to draw your attention to the Cycle Trails Website (www.cornwalltrails.net). The web-site has been designed by the Mining Villages Regeneration Group to encourage people to pass into villages and towns during their walks by designing circular routes leading off the main trails. Many trail users also use hand-held devices (smart phones, etc.). The site is well-used and is being upgraded to include the following features:

- Locally devised and described circular detour routes which will be mapped, described and carry images of local landmarks and facilities such as pubs, tea rooms, etc;
- The main trail maps will be described along with notable local features, in discussion with the local council.



Illogan Parish Council has been invited to join this project to provide 3 trails for inclusion on the website along with the following two other aspects:

- * waymarks provided free but their positioning and maintenance would be the council's responsibility;
- * An annual subscription of £100 with the council becoming voting member-owners of it.

The upgrade will improve site security; improve the way it is seen on mobile and tablet screens; effect search engine optimisation with a review of 'key words' and generally improve the look and feel of the site.

SPINAL INJURIES ASSOCIATION

Also look out for apple blossom emerging in the orchard and on still days you may hear greater spotted woodpeckers drumming on hollow tree trunks.

GARDENER'S CORNER

This time of year is one of the most exciting in the garden as we say goodbye to Winter and begin to feel the first signs of Spring as the garden begins to come to life again with gradually increasing light and warmth.

Whilst keeping an eye on the local forecast it's time to :

- prune shrubs, climbers and evergreen hedges
- chit potato tubers
- net fruit & veg crops to keep off the birds
- plant shallots, onions sets and early potatoes
- prepare vegetable seed beds
- keep the garden tidy



If all goes to the seasonal plan March sees in the 'official' start to Spring with further increases in light and temperature.



Main jobs will include :

- keeping on top of weeds as they make a comeback
- freshen up containers with new compost
- plant summer flowering bulbs
- lift & divide clumps of perennials
- open greenhouse and conservatory doors to vent on warm days
- mow the lawn on dry days

Into April and Spring is definitely now in evidence as daffodils and flowering trees start to bloom (although depending where you are they may already be flowering!)

It's an exciting time with indoor-sown seeds well into growth and it's also time to start sowing outdoors – although watch out for late frosts !

Time to :

- sow hardy annuals and herb seeds
- feed shrubs and roses
- tie in rambling and climbing roses
- sow / repair lawns and bare patches
- protect fruit blossom / tender plants from late frosts
- keeps those weeds under control



This is definitely the best time of year to enjoy a Cornish garden so don't forget to take time to make the most of this wonderful season.
